I was immediately impressed with the level of care and responsibility to the migrant workers, volunteers, and staff. I found that the 2020 growing season offered empathy in its purest form. Medical Director: Teresa Wurst, MD


Like everywhere else in the world, our lives were drastically changed by the COVID-19 pandemic. The Hartville Migrant Clinic quickly adapted to protect the health of the migrants and staff at the clinic. A smart phone was purchased for telehealth visits with the help of our interpreters. There were still many in-person patient visits for acute care, chronic care, and wellness visits. Migrants and volunteers were carefully screened before coming into the building to assure the safety of everyone. COVID-19 testing was performed onsite due to the



difficulty our migrants had getting testing at another location. The outpouring of assistance with over 900 masks from numerous donors was appreciated. This allowed us to ensure that all migrants and their families had an ample supply of masks for both adults and children. We also received a generous donation of thirty 3-D printed face shields to protect the staff. Aultman Family Medicine residents and attending physicians, private practice physicians, retired physicians, nurses, phlebotomists, and interpreters worked together to provide safe, evidence-based, high-quality medical care to the migrant farmworkers and their families. We welcomed Dr. Diana Tec this year, faculty member at Aultman Family Residency Program, who provided primary care services including obstetric care. Experienced local family physician Dr. Linda Keith was another new caregiver at the clinic. Educator Dr. Kit Belen, faculty member from NEOMED, cared for patients throughout the season. Recent Aultman Family Medicine Residency graduate, Dr. Preston Houston, fluent in Spanish, was a welcome addition. Recently retired ER physician Dr. Becky Clark also joined our team of volunteers. Due to the pandemic, we did not utilize student volunteers in nursing, pre-med, pharmacy, or medical. Hopefully, next season we will again invite a wide variety

of student volunteers to experience the same joy we have in providing this valuable service to the underserved migrant farmworkers of Hartville.

We were blessed with the continued generosity of private donors, organizations, and pharmaceuticals from AmeriCares. Grants from the North Canton Medical Foundation, Community Health Services Foundation, AHEC (Area Health Education Center), and the Ohio Department of Health Uninsured Care Funds. These grants provide interpreter services, medications, pre-



scription assistance, purchase medical supplies, assist with specialist visits, provide vaccines, radiology services, lab tests, and other valuable services.

The Migrant Clinic provided 230 patient visits to 105 women and 125 men. These numbers include 35 children visits. We held 22 Well Child Visits throughout the season with 19 additional immunization, 16 GYN, and 3 mammogram visits. Additionally, 5 tuberculosis screening tests, 80 influenza vaccines, 1 pneumonia vaccine, and 4 tetanus boosters were provided. The number of tuberculosis screening tests were reduced due to the pandemic and prioritized to those at highest risk. Migrants were educated with Spanish handouts and signs describing how to keep safe during the pandemic. As always, the migrant workers were incredibly grateful for the care we provided. By the end of the season, I was frequently told that they hoped “God would bless us all and keep us and our families safe.” I am continually amazed and humbled by their strong faith and concern for others despite their own difficult circumstances. We can all learn from their example of what is important in life—God, family, friends, and neighbors.

Spiritual Development

In 2020, weekly First Communion (taught by Gabriela Martinez and Yamilet Fleming), Confirmation (taught by Michelle Valentine, Deacon Mike and Dianne Capitena), and Baptism Preparation (taught by Sr. Karen Lindenberger and Sr. Karen Bernhardt) continued outside with masks and social distancing. Bible Study classes (taught by Philippe, Maria, and nephew Gonzalez) and Weekly mass (concelebrated by Fr. Ernesto Rodriguez, and Fr. Sean Conoboy, from the Youngstown Diocese, and Fr. Chris Zerucha from the Diocese of Cleveland) continued.



The final Mass of the Sacraments service was held on August 30 in the open field on Duquette Ave. Nearly 200 individuals came to celebrate life through the wise words of Father Christopher Zerucha, who officiated the mass in Spanish, while Deacon Mike Capitena preached the Homily for a bilingual mass. Three individuals received first Communion, two were confirmed and one was baptized. This mass was followed by a delicious dinner provided by Holy Spirit Parish Knights of Columbus and some of the migrant workers' families. The service of the Hispanic Ministries in Hartville, Ohio, orchestrated by Yamilet Fleming, Dianne and Deacon Mike Capitena, and Philippe and Maria Gonzalez, bring both Liturgical and Catechetical programs to the migrant workers and their families each year.

The goal of Hispanic Ministries is to encourage and strengthen the spiritual

life of the farmworkers and families. This is provided through weekly Spanish language services and religious education for children and youth, the administration of the sacraments, and adult Bible study. Not only did Deacon Mike Capitea help with weekly lessons, but he also prepared and married a migrant couple at Holy Spirit Catholic Church. The final Mass of the season again ended with a trip to the Shrine of Our Lady Guadalupe in Windsor, Ohio.

In memory of Sister Estrada

The summer ministry program and volunteers would like to say how sad we are at the death of Sister Maria Estrada who passed away on January 24, 2020. She will be greatly missed. We know that she is in a better place now.



Education: Summer Program

Just as the COVID-19 pandemic closed schools in much of the country this spring, the Migrant Ministry’s summer education program was also affected by restrictions. However, under the leadership of first-time director Mike Farrell, Marlinton Local Schools provided a modified and creative approach to the situation. The result was a successful six-week summer program that served a total of 21 K-8 students.

The summer education program began as a remote learning experience. During that time, Mike Farrell and his staff drafted a plan to return to in-person teaching. Their plan was approved by the Stark County Health Department and the first day of in-person classes was held on July 13 and ran through July 24. Only two students chose to continue remote learning.



The technology needed for the remote summer program was provided by Marlinton Local Schools. Students in grades K-2 were furnished with iPads, and students in grades 3-8 used Chromebooks (totalling 6 iPads and 15 Chromebooks). Twelve families used Marlinton’s kajeets for hot spots, while five families used their own internet service.

Teachers used curriculum from the regular school year, but modified lessons

and assignments to meet the needs of each student. Evaluation and monitoring occurred via the i-Ready computer program which is used to obtain an initial diagnostic score. The focus of this program was on student skills in math and reading. At the end of the program, students took a second exam to determine their progress over the summer.

While i-Ready distance learning provided a successful way to continue core education, many of the students' favorite elements of the usual summer program were removed from the curriculum due to COVID-19 restrictions. To everyone's disappointment, all field trips and special guest speakers were suspended until next year.

The bookmobile was not able to visit students for the same reason. However, the summer program still included special moments for many kids as they navigated the "new normal." Students really enjoyed video chats via Google Meets which allowed them to see their peers and teachers and created a sense of community missing in distance learning. Perhaps the most exciting event of all was simply permission to return to the school building after the in-person plan was approved.

At summer's start, when students participated in distance learning, Marlinton food services prepared and delivered meals to the students at the camps. Once students returned to the building, breakfast and lunch were provided during the day along with a take-home dinner.

High school students who need to make up credits from the regular school year continue remote learning through Marlinton's Odysseyware program. However, this year, Marlinton counselors discovered that all students were up-to-date on their high school credits.

Education: Daycare

Due to issues at the state and federal levels, the DCI Daycare/Head Start program was unavailable this year. Great Lakes Community Action, based in Ohio, is taking over the Migrant Head Start contract. The plan is to extend the coverage and meet the ever-growing needs of the Migrant families in the 2021 season.

Education: ESL and GED

This year, Celeste Hudak volunteered to teach ESL (English as a Second Language) which met on Monday evenings through September 14. The all-adult class focused on practicing the communication skills needed to successfully navigate everyday situations such as shopping for groceries. Class members gained a heightened sense of confidence knowing they could complete day-to-day tasks more easily. Each class, which met outdoors under the pavilion, ended on a festive note with lighthearted chats.



Education: Library

The reading program that was begun last year was continued this year in partnership with the Stark County Library's Lake Community Branch. The focus of the program was to encourage more readers to use the Migrant Center's library by offering gift cards to those who completed a certain number of books. The \$5 gift cards were obtained from a variety of restaurants and shops in and around Hartville. A kick-off event for the program was held on Tuesday, June 23, and the program ran until August 11. Given COVID-19 restrictions, it was attended as well as could be expected.

In order to encourage even more use of the Center's library next year, plans are being made for it to be moved to the open space in the main area of the building where new shelves will be built and additional books added to the inventory. The project will be completed this winter. The library was open during clinic hours Mondays and Tuesdays and staffed by volunteers.

Hospitality

Hartville Migrant Ministry was blessed to continue the traditional hospitality initiatives in the 2020 growing season. As the migrant families arrived, they registered remotely and were given Welcome Bags filled with basic day-to-day necessities along with bed linens and pillows. In addition, Agape Bread Ministry again graciously delivered assortments of bread on a weekly basis. At the start of the school year, children received book bag gift cards and school supplies provided by our generous donors.

Website

Properties

Major Projects Completed

2020 was a year of upgrading at the Migrant Center. During the winter months, the main restroom was upgraded. This included making the restrooms bigger for easier use. Another major plus for the restroom upgrade was that one became handicap accessible. This was a huge benefit for everyone.

Our second major upgrade was replacing the flooring on the main floor. The new floor requires much less maintenance. Stripping the wax and re-waxing every



year is no longer required, which saves many hours of labor by our volunteers so they can concentrate on other projects. Both improvements made sanitizing and infection control protocols easier to maintain.

Spring Cleanup

We had 2 major workdays in the spring this year. Usually the spring is a time when we set up all the sporting equipment for the migrants. Unfortunately, due to COVID-19, we chose not to set up the sporting equipment this year.

Instead, we focused on getting the building ready for the season. Our volunteers did an excellent job with all the projects to make the building and grounds look nicer for the season. We had volunteers who became professional power washers as we cleaned the building. Some of our volunteers added to our mulch collection by cleaning the gutters. We had some professional landscapers as well. Our volunteers cleaned the flower beds and mulched them. Other volunteers became artists as they painted the fence and the stairs into the building. Some of our volunteers became movers as they moved the benches out of the basement so that the migrants would have areas to sit while waiting for the medical center. We also set up the picnic tables so the migrants would have seating in the summer.



Fall/Winter Workday

Again this fall, we held two major workdays and were blessed with many volunteers helping at the Center.

A new group of volunteers became professional landscapers as they raked the flower bed and trimmed the bushes.



Our professional carpentry crew built a deck for the port-a-potty and secured it to the deck. This will prevent the potty from tipping over in the winter wind. The deck is built with old wood taken from an overhang that was becoming a safety hazard and new wood donated to the Migrant Center. The overhang was removed by demolition volunteers. Skilled organizers cleaned out the sports and tool storage areas. It is now neatly organized so storage materials can be easily accessed. As we do every year, the benches were moved to the basement and picnic tables stacked under cover to protect them from the winter weather.

A special thanks to Hartville Hardware for donating flooring for the Migrant Center. Hartville Hardware has always been very supportive. The Migrant Center would also like to thank the many volunteers who spent hours assisting with projects to maintain and upgrade the Migrant Center. We are truly blessed to have so many wonderful volunteers who donate their time, talent, and finances.


Finance


