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## MIDDLE SCHOOL PROGRAMMING REVIEW

The Migrant Ministry has completed a seven-week summer program for middle school students from the Hartville migrant community. Eight middle schoolers came to the center each day (except Friday) from 12:30-4:30 pm for programs developed and facilitated by two paid interns and countless volunteers. Throughout the program, all activities were centered on the three fundamental principles of Innovation, Connection, and Confidence.

Each week had a theme and followed the below format:


Monday: Topic exploration via field trip experience

Tuesday: Project brainstorming and drafting

Wednesday: Project design and prototyping

Thursday: Project completion and presentation





One of the student's favorite parts was getting to design their own ice cream business. They went to Handel's Ice Cream in Green that week to learn how ice cream is manufactured. Later in the week, they launched their own "business" and eventually sold over 40 orders of ice cream to members of the local community. Another week, the students got to go to Beatty's Sports Shop in Louisville and learn about the process of designing and manufacturing t-shirts. Later on, the kids were able to create their t-shirts online, which were subsequently printed at Beatty's.

## STARK COMMUNITY FOUNDATION'S SIX FOR 60 CAMPAIGN

The Hartville Migrant Ministry was chosen to take part in the Stark Community Foundation's Six for 60 Campaign, which is a voting competition among local nonprofits.
